LANDED TROUT:

Less than 6" = 2 points	12" = 80 points
7" = 10 points	13" = 100 points
8" = 20 points	14" = 125 points
9" = 30 points	15" = 150 points
10" = 40 points	16" = 175 points
11" = 60 points	17" and over = 200 points

BONUS POINTS:

Add 50 points per inch
for trout over 16 inches

RULES

- This is a fly fishing tournament only. All fish must be caught on artificial flies using a bamboo fly rod.
- Safe and sustainable handling of fish must be practiced at all times! This is a catch and release tournament so all fish must be released back to the water.
- Anglers can fish the Battenkill anywhere in Vermont or New York state.
- Anglers will record the total number of fish caught and the length of each fish. Only fish handled by the angler and successfully released count as being caught. At the end of the time period (last cast at 1:00 pm EDT), anglers will turn the score card in to the official judge for scoring.
- Scoring will be based on the honor system. Please make every effort to measure your catch while the fish remains in the water, using a soft ruler whenever possible.
- Score cards must be turned in by 4:00 pm on Friday, May 1 at AMFF. Winner will be announced at 5:00 pm at the Arlington Common Campus.

MEASURING FISH

- Help to minimize harm to each fish caught and measured using the tape provided or your own device if preferred.
- Do not remove fish from water if possible and handle gently with wet hands.
- Extend the tape from fish's closed lower lip to the bottom fork of the tail.
- Each fish is measured to the smallest whole number. A 16¼" inch fish is registered as a 16" fish, for example.
